CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Board Co-Chair Dan Newton at 9:33 a.m.

STAFF AND BOARD REPORTS

Executive Director (Jim Paul)

- Director of Communications Jordan Benner and Public Affairs Manager Inka Bajandas attended the Association for Communication Excellence Annual Conference in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in June. They were recognized for their outstanding work on OFRI's special report and video series, receiving two Gold Awards and one Bronze Award.
- Over the next six to 12 months, Jim will prioritize workforce development initiatives in collaboration with the Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC). This effort will aim to strengthen pathways into forestry-related careers and align educational programs with industry workforce needs.
- Plans are underway to meet with Acting State Forester Kate Skinner and OFRI Deputy Director of
 Forestry Julie Woodward to discuss increasing visibility of OFRI's Values and Beliefs Survey
 results before the state Board of Forestry. The meeting will also focus on developing effective
 communication strategies to support OFRI staff in promoting and articulating these values and
 beliefs, both internally and externally.

Board Members

 Gordon Culbertson introduced and welcomed Mike Cafferata as the new executive director of the Oregon Small Woodlands Association (OSWA). In June, Dan Newton was introduced as the association's new president.

Administration (Kathy Storm and Joni Nebril)

- OregonBuys: Executive Assistant Joni Nebril reported that staff have successfully completed our first full fiscal year using OregonBuys. This procurement system has proved to be an effective and valuable tool, streamlining the invoice process and helping us pay vendors promptly. By improving efficiency and accuracy, OregonBuys has strengthened our financial operations and enhanced vendor relationships.
- **Sortly:** A cloud-based inventory software, Sortly continues to be an effective tool for tracking publication inventory and distribution. Over the past year, more than 50,000 units were distributed statewide and beyond, including over 7,000 copies of OFRI's latest publications:

- Oregon Forest Facts 2025-26 Edition, Oregon's Forest Protection Laws: An Illustrated Manual, and Sourcing from Sustainable Forests: From Forest to Frame.
- Forest Products Harvest Tax levels: Director of Business Operations Kathy Storm reported that the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) revised their projections for fiscal year 2025-26 from 3.186 BBF to 3.428 BBFin revenue.

Public Education (Jordan Benner and Inka Bajandas)

- Educational advertising: The spring educational advertising campaign ran from March 10 through June 8, 2025. This campaign included broadcast as well as digital media. DHM Research completed post-campaign awareness testing the week after the campaign ended. A full report has been distributed to the board of directors and will be discussed in the current board meeting. With the start of a new fiscal year, GARD Communications has begun the production process for the new creative. Production will be ongoing between now and February 2026, with plans for a spring 2026 campaign launch.
- Websites: With a new web development contractor in place, OregonForests.org and LearnForests.org underwent security and structural updates. OFRI also developed and launched a brand-new version of OregonEnvirothon.org. Previously, OregonEnvirothon.org was an outdated, legacy version of the site that OFRI had been trying to manage. OFRI agreed to take over the cost, build and maintenance of the site moving forward.
- Hood to Coast sponsorship: As part of our sponsorship of Hood to Coast 2025 (H2C) in August,
 OFRI produced numerous promotional items to be distributed to H2C's audience, including
 digital and printed materials going out to over 19,000 participants. In addition, OFRI created a
 fun, commemorative poster to be handed out at the finish line festival.
- ACE conference and awards: Director of Communications Jordan Benner and Public Affairs Manager Inka Bajandas attended the Association for Communication Excellence (ACE) Annual Conference last month in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. During this professional development conference for agriculture and natural resources communicators, they accepted two Gold Awards and a Bronze Award recognizing their work creating educational materials for OFRI. Inka received two golds for the Sourcing from Sustainable Forests special report in the 2025 ACE Critique and Awards Program's publishing and writing categories. Her award for "writing within a specialized publication" was for the Portland airport project case study in the sustainability report. Jordan received a Bronze Award for the three-part Reforestation in Oregon video series he filmed and produced. Copies of the award certificates for the three awards are in board packets.
- Social media intern: Our current social media intern, Henry Thomas, graduated from the University of Oregon last month, which means his internship will come to an end soon. He plans to continue his work managing and creating content for our social media accounts through the end of this summer as we seek to hire his replacement. The deadline for Oregon-based undergraduate college students to apply for our 2025-26 social media internship closed on July 1, and we plan to interview finalists for the position later this month with the hopes of having a new intern on board in September. In the meantime, Henry has been working on a desk guide and other guidance for his replacement that should help smooth the transition. He's currently seeking full-time employment and is interested in continuing to work in the forest sector. If you

become aware of any opportunities you think would be a good fit for him, don't hesitate to reach out.

ODF partnership

 Julie and Director of Communications Jordan Benner presented at the Forest Resources Division meeting June 12 to over 60 people. The focus was on the National Woodland Owner Survey and the new OFRI Values and Beliefs Survey.

• Reforestation network

 A new partnership is being developed, called the Pacific Northwest Reforestation Network. Julie attended a meeting in June with over 55 participants to discuss reforestation. She expressed to the network's board the importance of Oregon landowners' representation and access to tools and resources for success in land management.

Landowner publications

Reforestation will be the topic of the next landowner publication. Our *Guide to Reforestation in Oregon* was published in 2006, and we're looking to update it as an indepth guide for forestry.

• Know Your Forest website

 Much effort by staff has gone into updating the content and technical aspects of the site. The new site launch is expected by this fall.

Oregon forest sector economic report

 Work is underway with contractors at Oregon State University and the University of Idaho. An initial presentation of the findings will be presented to the board of directors in October, and the summary and full report will be available in 2026.

Educational programming and events

- Oregon Women in Lumber event, May 12 led and facilitated
- o Oregon Urban & Community Forestry Conference, May 15 tabled
- Oregon Society of CPAs Forest Products Conference, June 24 presented
- Oregon Family Forest Convention and Tour, June 25-27 presented
- Forest Wildlife Research Summit at OSU, October 30 OFRI event

K-12 Education (Rikki Heath and Jenna Mendenhall)

- Oregon Envirothon: The 2025 Oregon Envirothon brought together more than 170 students on 35 teams from 20 schools across the state. Logos Charter School's team, the Rogue Pack Alpha, was the overall winner of the competition, which means they will move on to the NCF-Envirothon in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. Jenna is headed to the international competition to gain experience and understand how Envirothon works in other states across the nation. OFRI worked with contractor Hounder to launch our new Oregon Envirothon website early this summer. Check it out at www.oregonenvirothon.org.
- Youth conservation crew: Jenna and Rikki worked with the Youth Conservation Corps crew from the Boys & Girls Club of Salem, Marion and Polk Counties this week at The Oregon Garden. They maintained trails, educational areas and Christmas trees, and demolished a fence. They also received forestry and career education at the end of the week. We've been partnering with this group for the past nine years.
- **High school regional experience workshop**: In August, staff will partner with the Oregon Natural Resources Education Program to provide a workshop for high school teachers. This year we're holding a workshop about *Forest Resiliency in a Changing Climate* in the Santiam Canyon, five years after the Labor Day fires.
- Oregon Garden Natural Resources Education Program: This spring nearly 1,200 students visited The Oregon Garden for an educator-led program. School visits were lower this year, as several schools had to cancel their trips due to bus and administrative challenges.
- Outdoor School: OFRI is part of the Salem-Keizer Outdoor School Coalition, a collection of agencies that provide Salem-Keizer students with a non-residential outdoor school program called "PAWS" (Plants, Animals, Water and Soil). This spring PAWS served over 200 students from two Salem-Keizer schools at four different sites throughout the Salem area. This summer we will be updating the *Nature Notes* journal used at each site.
- **Home School Day:** OFRI will hold our annual Home School Day event at The Oregon Garden in September. This provides an educational opportunity for homeschool students. We work with our partners in Marion County to set up self-paced learning stations throughout the garden on topics such as forest as a habitat, fire prevention, bugs, plant adaptation, birds, macroinvertebrates and many others. In the past we've seen up to 500 people attend this event.

Newly appointed OSWA Executive Director Mike Cafferata shared his vision and plans for the organization's future. His priorities include increasing membership, strengthening understanding of the statewide landscape and seeking feedback from the board to help guide OSWA's direction. Mike is focused on learning OSWA's issues, people and processes while fostering fellowship, education and collaboration with partners such as OFRI.

Fran Cafferata of Cafferata Consulting provided an overview of accomplishments in the Wildlife in Managed Forests landowner education program during fiscal year 2024-25.

Executive Director Jim Paul reviewed ODF's revised Forest Products Harvest Tax projections. Refer to the board packet for 2024-25 actuals, revenue and 2025-26 projections.

Executive Director Paul reviewed a budget scenario with revised harvest levels. Refer to the board packet.

Executive Director Paul updated the board on the workforce study for forest operations and management conducted for the Higher Education Coordinating Commission under Senate Bill 1552.

Director of Communications Jordan Benner introduced Alexis Wong of Gard Communications, who reported on data from the spring advertising campaign.

Director Benner reported on post-advertising test results completed by DHM Research.

Director Storm reviewed next steps for board members' Workday accounts, required training and compensation.

Deputy Director of Forestry Julie Woodward provided an overview of October's upcoming two-day board meeting and tour.

Director Storm reviewed the proposed 2026 board meeting calendar. A revised copy of the handout was provided to each board member. Board members concurred.

OREGON FOREST RESOURCES INSTITUTE FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT REPORT June 2025 Variance Explanation

REVENUE

BEGINNING BALANCE - Higher due to cost savings from Fiscal Year 2023-24.

SALES/OTHER REVENUE - PERS employee payment when PERS wasn't deducted from paycheck (\$2,025). SPOTS rebates (\$1,969.30). Royalty from OSU (\$30.81). Grant funding from ODF was invoiced in early Fiscal Year 2025-26.

HARVEST TAX - First quarter payment \$86,433.29 (8.9%) lower than budget. Second quarter payment \$33,651.73 (4%) lower than budget. Third quarter payment \$318,598.57 (29.6%) lower than budget. Fourth quarter payment \$80,029.56 (9%) more than budget. Overall, total havest tax received \$3,420,787.89, resulting in \$358,654.03 (33.5%) under budget.

EXPENDITURES

EXPENDABLE PROPERTY - Replacement of more computers than estimated. To prevent this in the future, we've changed to a three-year replacement schedule rather than four years.

At the Oregon Forest Resources Institute (OFRI), we strive to be the most credible source of quality information and education about managing and sustaining Oregon's forests for all the benefits they provide.

More than 89,000 students participated in OFRI-supported field forestry education programs. The K-12 education program also updated the curriculum and student workbook for the natural resources education program we provide at The Oregon Garden in Silverton to ensure both meet the latest state science education standards.

OFRI also published the latest revision of *Oregon's Forest Protection Laws: An Illustrated Manual* to include the monumental changes to the Oregon Forest Practices Act resulting from the collaborative Private Forest Accord agreement. This popular publication is used by small forest landowners, professional foresters and regulators alike.

Finally, this past year also saw material progress toward meeting the priorities of our strategic plan, which will continue to guide how OFRI grows its programs and improves its methods for enhancing Oregonians' understanding of the social, environmental and economic benefits of our forests.

These are just a few highlights from the past fiscal year. Read on to learn more about our work in 2024-25 to help Oregonians of all ages better understand and appreciate our forests.



Updated *Illustrated Manual* made available in print

OFRI published the long-awaited hard-copy version of the updated *Oregon's* Forest Protection Laws: An Illustrated Manual.



First published

in 2002 to offer guidance, using detailed illustrations, to forest landowners and operators on following state forestry laws, OFRI's *Illustrated Manual* has since gone through several revisions as the laws have changed. The recently published revised fourth edition of the manual was necessary following major changes to Oregon's forest practice regulations.

Free printed copies of the manual can be ordered through the publication library on OFRI's website, **OregonForests.org**.

TREE SCHOOLS OFFERED ACROSS OREGON

OFRI's landowner education staff and contractors taught classes and provided educational materials, including the newly printed *Illustrated Manual*, to woodland owners from across the state at Oregon State University Extension Service's Tree School Clackamas in Oregon City, as well as regional Tree Schools in southern and eastern Oregon.

TOUR DEMONSTRATES ALTERNATIVE WAYS TO MANAGE WOODY DEBRIS

More than 70 people attended an educational field tour for forest landowners that OFRI co-hosted in Corvallis to demonstrate ways to manage woody debris on forestland in the wildland-urban interface.

The Alternative Approaches to Woody Residue Management tour visited a suburban forest

parcel undergoing fire risk reduction and habitat restoration work. It included demonstrations of woody debris mastication and the use of an air curtain incinerator.

Oregon Forest Facts updated



OFRI published the 2025-26 edition of its *Oregon Forest Facts* publication.

The pocket-sized booklet, which has long been a mainstay of the Institute's educational resources, serves as a detailed reference guide to Oregon's forests and forest-based economy. It includes information, maps, graphs and statistics about forestland ownership, timber harvest, forest-based employment and wood products production.

Along with the printed version and downloadable PDF, the information found in the *Oregon Forest Facts 2025-26*Edition is available on a dedicated website,

OregonForestFacts.org.

The updated *Oregon Forest Facts* includes the latest statistics on Oregon's average forest sector wages, softwood lumber and plywood production, and total wildland fires and acres burned in the state over the past decade, among other data related to Oregon's forests.





healthy forests.



Find Your Path looks at the wide range of employment opportunities available in Oregon's forest sector, including information about the education, training and experience required to pursue each of the featured career paths, as well as a QR code that directs students to the current salary ranges for each position.





OREGON ENVIROTHON CONTINUES TO EXPAND

OFRI's K-12 education program organized another successful Oregon Envirothon, an annual natural resource knowledge competition for high school students.

More than 170 students representing 20 high schools from across the state attended the 2025 Oregon Envirothon, held in May at The Oregon Garden in Silverton.

To help prepare teachers whose students were planning to participate in this year's Oregon Envirothon, OFRI hosted a training day in December 2024 at The Oregon Garden that included information about the competition's "core four" subject areas in addition to the 2025 current environmental issue and oral presentation scenario.








OFRI board of directors

The Oregon Forest Resources Institute is governed by a board made up of 11 voting members appointed by the state forester, plus two non-voting members.
